Pat Burnley

“Lady of the House” and Founder of Kitchen Kettle Village



In 1954, Pat and her husband Bob Burnley launched what was to become Kitchen Kettle Village. Starting out with a stack of two-gallon kettles and gas burners they set up operation in their new two-car garage, making jams and jellies. Over time, the garage became a tourist attraction in its own right as visitors stopped to watch the jelly making process and enjoy a sample along with a fresh brewed cup of coffee.

Today with two generations of Burnleys by her side in the family business, Pat vows she will stop coming to work “when it is not fun any more.” She can be found in the Village’s Kling House Restaurant busing tables, at new product meetings, and gracing newspaper ads and billboards.

Her signature Chow Chow recipe was developed over many years to create the perfect blend of sweet and sour packed full of end-of-the-garden vegetables. Today it remains one of the Village’s top selling relishes.

Born and raised in Lancaster County’s town of Intercourse, Pennsylvania, Pat Burnley spent the first eight years of her formal education in a one-room school house, and learned to cook and can from her mother. She also attended high school and Lancaster Business College, followed by two years at Drexel University in their secretarial program.

As the mother of three children, all of who started in the family business at age two and play active roles in the growing business today, Pat is truly a pioneer entrepreneur. In 2007, she was awarded the inaugural Lifetime Achievement Award by the Pennsylvania Dutch Country Visitors Bureau, which has since been renamed the "Burnley Lifetime Achievement Award" in her honor. Most recently, Pat was the recipient of the Woman of Influence “Lifetime Achievement Award” from the Central Penn Business Journal. She was honored for making Central Pennsylvania a great place to work and live.

Joanne Ladley

Co-owner of Kitchen Kettle Village, owner of The Inn at Kitchen Kettle and Pat's daughter.

Known as the "Synergy Conductor", Joanne is a co-owner of Kitchen Kettle Village and owner of The Inn at Kitchen Kettle. She primarily concerns herself with the corporate culture at the Village. At Kitchen Kettle Village, that translates into making sure team members as well as guests are having fun. After leading the operations, marketing and administrative departments for 30 years, Joanne transitioned her operations and administrative roles to the third generation, Michelle Rondinelli.

Jim is the owner of Burnley Enterprises, Inc., a specialty retail company. He owns and oversees several of the signature stores at Kitchen Kettle Village, providing a range of sophisticated shopping that complements the variety of local food and craft shops run by Lancaster County shop keepers throughout the Village.

The stores include two Deerskin Leather stores (one at the Village), Good Vibes, Girls Day Out, two Brighton Collectibles stores, By Candle Light, The Jewelry Box and Village Quilts. Each Burnley Enterprises, Inc. store has at least one major brand name company that they represent.

National brands include the Brighton Leather Collection and Uggs from California, Life is Good, Vera Bradley, Yankee Candle, Pandora Jewelry, John Medeiros Jewelry, and the Village Quilt store which has only commissioned hand made quilts signed by the artist.

Jim and the staff at Burnley Enterprises have achieved several retail related awards, and achievements including
